Getting to know Buc Bay residents

Middle school fits her style fine

eanna Hellbusch feels right at home as a teacher at the Plattsmouth Middle School. After all, she considers herself a small-town girl after growing up in western Nebraska. Born in Kearney, she graduated from Sidney High School, and her father ended up working for Cabela's.

Dee chose to attend the University of Nebraska at Kearney, where she earned a scholarship to play softball.

"I played four years there," she said, "and ended up going there for another year and a half, because I changed my major. I originally was going to go into physical therapy, and then I decided if I wanted to be a mom and have kind of a life, I changed my process and got a degree in biology with a minor in nutrition."

Armed with that degree, Dee's first teaching job was in Plattsmouth. She shared her story on how she landed here in a recent interview.

In Dee's final year on the UNK softball team, she discovered a freshman teammate, Shannon Hunt, was from Plattsmouth. While Dee was having trouble finding her first job after graduating, she received a phone call from Shannon.

Recalls Dee: "Shannon said Plattsmouth was looking for a biology teacher and softball coach and that her mom was on the school board."

Shannon said she told her mom that Dee might be interested in the position.

"I took off the next day and drove to Plattsmouth," Dee said. "I had no idea where Plattsmouth was. I was interviewed, and that same day they hired me."

So in 1995, Dee began her teaching career that today is in its 27th year.

"It's a long time," she said, chuckling, "and I'm feeling it a little bit."

Not long after moving to Plattsmouth, Dee's life would take on another major change. That's when she met Kevin Hellbusch, and in 2000 they were married.

They have two children. The oldest is daughter Rylee, 19, who is currently attending Peru State College and is resident assistant on campus. Son Kasten, 16, is a sophomore at PHS and a member of the golf team. He also shoots trap for the Bellevue trap team.



Deanna Hellbusch has been at the Plattsmouth Middle School for the past 16 years and is into her 27th year of teaching here. "It's been a long time," she said.

"As a family, we have always loved camping, fishing and deer hunting together," Dee said. "We also enjoy boating on the Missouri and on the Platte River on our airboat."

There's a Bay Hills Golf Course connection with the children as both were employed by the clubhouse this summer.

"They really enjoyed meeting many of the regular golfers that were out and about all summer," Dee said. "Rylee worked in the clubhouse, and Kasten was a cart boy."

Dee: COVID-19 pandemic was hard on teachers, students

The first school Dee worked at was the alternative school located closer to downtown by the old football field. She taught mornings there and then drove to the high school in the afternoon teaching biology. The athletic director was Don Freeburg, who also was a biology teacher.

"They needed to free up time for him," Dee said, "so that's how they created the job that got me here. But that only lasted that one year. The alternative school wasn't really where I wanted to be."

At that time, the middle school's seventh-grade biology teacher was retiring, opening a spot for Dee. After three or four years there, she moved to the high school to teach biology, anatomy, physiology and physical science. That was when Plattsmouth High moved to its current location.

Dee was still coaching softball, which made the move to the new building more convenient.

"It was nice to be in the same building as my athletes," she said.

She stayed there until 2006, when she returned to the middle school.

"I remember that," she said, "because that's the year when my son was born. I taught for about a month and then had him in September."

"The inconsistency of home life has had a big effect on how kids are at school. They're dealing with a lot more than what kids did 15 or 20 years ago."

On a brighter note, there is the other side of the coin, she said.

"We have a ton of kids who are great," Dee said. "The ones who we struggle with kind of overshadow the others. We try to focus on the kids who always do everything right. But if you talk to

Kevin Hellbusch was living in Buccaneer Bay when he met Dee.

"He moved into Ewel Court in 1990," she said. "There weren't very many homes here back then. This place looks completely different."

Dee said teaching during the COVID-19 pandemic was difficult.

"The kids have been through a lot, of course, over the last few years," she said. "That put a big shift in there with the uncertainty every day."

But there's more to it, she added.

"Personally, I feel like a lot of it is the culture of families," Dee said. "We have a lot of kids who are struggling at home, and that transports to the classroom. Sometimes it has to do with family dynamics, because you have kids who are in one home one week and another the next week.

any teacher today, it doesn't matter where you are."

There is a benefit to teaching in a smaller community, she said.

"I've stayed in Plattsmouth," Dee said, "because truly I love the community, I love the kids I've taught. We don't deal with the really harsh kids. We don't have kids walking out of our rooms calling us names.

"I've never searched for going somewhere else. I could have gone to Bellevue or somewhere else close. But here it's always felt like home."

Having resided in Buc Bay longer than many of our residents, Dee said it's been a great place to raise a family.

"I came here knowing no one, of course," she said. "I've made life-long friends. Overall, it's a great community."

A belated salute to our veterans

I can't believe this is the 12th newsletter I've produced since taking it over from Janet McCartney. Where has the time gone? I look back at how it seems like it was just a month ago when we moved here, but it was July 1, 2017.

When I prepare this newsletter, I try to plan ahead. Sometimes I'll forget something I intended to include, and I did it again last month by not mentioning Veterans Day, which took place Nov. 11. As a vet, I should have noted how many



veterans we have in Buccaneer Bay including those who served in combat situations.

As I had mentioned on Facebook last month, I was fortunate in that all of my 35 months in the Army were

spent on three bases: Fort Leonard Wood, Mo.; Fort Sill, Okla.; and Fort Carson, Colo.

My hope after arriving at my permanent station was to become a clerk, since I was pretty quick on the typewriter. As luck would have it, the clerk in my unit was a two-year draftee and was serving his last couple of months in my artillery company. His name is one I'll never forget: T Bob Pickett. I asked him what the "T" stood for, and he said, "Nothing. That's my first name."

T Bob did a great job of training me, and I became "Radar" O'Reilly in 1972, the year the series M*A*S*H began. Just like Radar, I learned how to wheel and deal for certain items.

During my second year at Fort Carson (1973), the post reestablished its baseball program. Each battalion made up the league, and I gave thought to trying out but decided against it. After watching a few of our battalion team's games I was convinced I likely could make the roster the following year.

Sure enough, I was right. We played 30 games and went undefeated in league play. After winning the postseason tournament, a trailer was pulled onto the pitcher's mound. It was filled with beer, and that's where we celebrated our title.

Many decades later, I was asked by middle son Derek, who then was teaching at Omaha Westside's middle school, if I'd participate in a Veterans Day assembly. I gladly said yes and was joined on the stage by two combat vets who served in Vietnam.

I spoke first, saying I felt a little out of place since I never left the states and wasn't in harm's way. The next vet to speak opened by looking at me and telling me we are all brothers, no matter when and where we served. Hearing those words made me feel incredibly uplifted.

So to all my fellow vets, I say thanks for your service. I hope you had an enjoyable Veterans Day last month.

Teachers play an important role in the lives of young people. It sure did for me, especially once I started high school in Papillion. pandemic. Today son Derek is teaching at Westside High, and he said online classes weren't ideal and just added to his workload.



Recipe of the month: Crockpot chicken and noodles

Add the frozen noodles and cook for 2 more hours. (Stir every 30 minutes until done.)







SID#5 Covenants - Architectural Control

The Buccaneer Bay Architectural Control process of reviewing requests for changes on your property is now being managed by Teresa Dilts and Kayla Graff. They will be working with Mike Jensen, Cass County Zoning Administrator.

There are 8 sets of Covenants for Buccaneer Bay. It seems like every time a new section of Buccaneer Bay opened up another set of covenants was made. I try to make sure that every resident in Buccaneer Bay gets a copy of the covenants that is for their section of the neighborhood. Some realtors will provide a copy of the covenants to the buyer, but I don't think all of them do. Most of the covenants have some sort of termination clause.

All sets of covenants are filed at the Register of Deeds office at the Court House. Not all of the covenants have the same number of years that the covenants are in force.

HILLS COVENANTS in the second section titled: "AMENDED DECLARATION OF COVENANTS, CONDITIONS AND RESTRICTIONS", which covers the following: These covenants shall run with the land and be binding upon the current and future Owners of all Lots in Blocks One (1) through Six (6), inclusive; all Lots in Blocks Fifteen (15) through Twenty (20), inclusive; Lots one (1) through Five (5) in Block Seven (7), and; Lot Ten (10) in Block Fourteen (14), all in Buccaneer Bay, a subdivision as surveyed, platted and recorded in Cass County, Nebraska, until the year 2029, together with any Lots created by a replat of these Lots, and shall be continued for successive periods of twenty-five (25) years unless sooner modified or terminated in writing by seventy-five percent (75%) or more of the then record owners of the Properties, with one vote per Lot.

BAY LAKE COVENANTS in the second section titled: "AMENDED DECLARATION OF COVENANTS, CONDITIONS AND RESTRICTIONS", which covers the following Blocks: Block 21, 22, 23, 24, and 26 until the year 2000, at which time the covenants shall be extended for *successive terms* of 25 years, which should make them good until 2025.

Block 31 in Buccaneer Bay incudes Windward Dr. and all side streets in this section, approved in September 2008 for term of 25 years, which would then expire in 2033.

Blk 28 Lots 8A/B, Lots 9A/B, and Lot 10 on Lakeside Dr. These first 2 townhomes and one house are under the original covenants for Lakeside Dr. approved May 18, 2005 for a term of 25 years, which should terminate in 2030.

Blk 28, Lots 1A – 24B, minus Lots 8A/B, 9A/B and Lot 10 on Lakeside Dr. as described in the Covenants from Lone Tree Holdings. Approved May 18, 2017 for a term of 30 years, which would terminate in 2047.

Bucc Bay 1st Edition – Lots 1R – 39R – Davy Jones Dr. and Davy Jones Cir. Filed February 14, 1996 for a term of 25 years, which would expire in *February 2021*, *if not renewed*.

Blk 29 Lots 1-26 Fairway Cir., Blk 30 Lots 1-6 – Fairway Dr. – Covenants and restrictions shall run with and bind the land and for a term of twenty-five years. Filed May 18th, 2005, which would expire in 2030.

Blk 27 Lots 1A - 20B, and Lots 21 - 62 - Sailboat Lake - The Covenants and restrictions shall run with and bind the land for a term of 25 years. Filed December 23, 1996, which would expire in *December 2021*, *if not renewed*.

Residents under the covenants that will be expiring can be renewed by having residents who want to have the covenants continue review and update them. Each set of covenants has a specification of how many signatures are required to approve the revised covenants. It has been done, but it takes a lot of work. Once the covenants are out of date, that section of residents will no longer have to follow any restrictions for their section.

Note: The process below may be modified as the Newsletter and Welcome Packages are being updated.

Each time a new resident moves in they receive a Welcome Package that has a copy of the covenants for their location. The information on new residents come in an email from Peoples Service. Jill Bobenhouse-Teaser will take on putting the Welcome Packages together and provide the packages to the appropriate Block Captain so the new resident can fill out a Data Sheet to be sent to one of the members taking over for Janet. The changes will require the new information to be added to the Buccaneer Bay Phone Directory, if the new resident approves, and update the Block Captains list as residents move in and out.
