



Getting to know Buc Bay residents

Homes sweet homes in Bay Hills

f you're looking for a Buc Bay resident who knows Plattsmouth better than most — if not all — just turn to Ed Brink. With all the transplants who live among us, it's hard to find a Plattsmouth native. Ed also knows the Cass County Courthouse better than most after serving as Clerk of the District Court and, later, Cass County Attorney before turning to private practice.

Born and raised here, he wouldn't want to reside anywhere else.

"We really like living here," Ed said. "It's very nice. I like that it's quiet and dark at night. I like the wildlife. I golf once in a blue moon but really badly."

Ed and wife Deb have lived on Lakeside Drive for nearly eight years. Before that, they lived on Fairway Drive starting around 2000. They built their current town home with the intention of moving Deb's dad into the adjacent unit.

"It worked good for us," Ed said. "We viewed it as a kind of modern day version of 'The Waltons.' We have a covered walkway in the back of the garage. We could walk around the side of the garage to his patio. You could go back and forth without getting wet."

Growing up in Plattsmouth, Ed graduated from Plattsmouth High School in 1976 when it was located closer to downtown. Five years later, he was appointed to become Cass County District Court Clerk. When the election came in 1982, he campaigned hard, going door-to-door, something he attributes to his winning the position on a permanent basis.

"That was kind of fun," he said. "I got to meet a lot of people."

So what, exactly, are the duties of a district court clerk?

"The clerk is basically the court administrator," Ed said. "He makes sure the judge's orders are sent out like they're supposed to be. I liked it."

While serving in that capacity in the late 1980s, Ed was taking night classes at Bellevue College (now Bellevue University). After graduating in 1988, he took the next step by applying for law school at Nebraska and Creighton. He was accepted by both.

"So I quit the District Court job, and went to law school (in Lincoln)," Ed recalled. "I worked for the Legislature when I got out of law school for a couple of years."

With his law degree in hand, Ed decided to run for the county attorney and won in 1994.

"That surprised a lot of people," he said, "including myself."

With Ed settled into his professional career, the only thing missing was adding a wife and starting a family. He recalls knowing his future wife long before they started dating.

Ed's next move was joining a law firm based out of Kansas City, Mo., called SouthLaw, which represented many of the top lenders in the country. He managed its Omaha office, which was located at 114th and Dodge. Again, Ed commuted from home each day.

"I didn't mind that at all," he said. "When the pandemic hit, our work screeched to a halt, because there wasn't a lot of foreclosures going on. A large percentage of the employees got let go, including me. I was disappointed with that, because I liked that job a lot."

After turning down a couple of job offers, Ed and Deb took the plunge outside of law and purchased a Scooters Coffee franchise — not in Nebraska but Branson, Mo.

"We spend a lot of time going back and forth," Ed said. "We're getting ready to build a second one, and we'll probably do another one. It's very different, but it's kind of fun."

Deb keeps busy herself as a real estate appraiser. She created Brink Residential Appraisal Services in 1997 and has been appraising homes all over the eastern portion of Nebraska, including Buccaneer Bay.

"With the rise in interest rates," Ed said, "the demand for mortgages has gone way down. Stuff still sells, but her business has slowed considerably, which, in a way I guess is OK. She has more time for the grandkids."

"I spent one day sick on the boat," Ed said, "and the rest of the crew got to see one of the castles from the Game of Thrones."

Ed tries to keep active by jogging when time permits. You might see him traversing Bay Road once in a while.

"I really like to eat," he said. "So if I don't run, I get real fat."

Ed doesn't enter a lot of road races, but he has completed a half marathon in Lincoln.

Ed and Deb have no plans to move from the home that has a backyard view of the golf course's 10th green.

"I like the friendliness of the neighbors," Ed said. "I like to watch the golfers and the wildlife. We actually have a fair amount of fun sitting out there having a cocktail and watching the golfers go by."

Having lived in Buc Bay all these years, Ed said he's witnessed the explosive growth of our subdivision.

"The biggest change, I would say, is the traffic," he said. "When we were living on Fairway in the '90s, you could go down Bay Road and not see another car."

Although the legend of Valentine's Day is still a question mark until now, the most well-known story comes from ancient Rome. There are three legends about the patron saint Valentine or Valentinus recognized by the Catholic Church.

In the beginning, there was a priest named Valentinus who lived in Rome in the third century. During this era, the emperor Claudius II (a pagan Catholic) introduced laws that forbade marriage. He argued that Christians must focus on paying tribute to Rome.

Despite this absurd prohibition, the priest still secretly held a wedding ceremony for a young couple. Unfortunately, he was discovered and executed.

Another story claims that this person was a bishop of Terni. He was martyred because of trying to free Christians from prison. The other version reveals that he left a letter to his lover (probably the jailer's daughter) signed "From your Valentine" before his death.


Valentinus became a popular saint in the Middle Ages regardless of the true story.

Update on mailbox move, dog park

One of our readers last month asked a question about talk going around of a possible dog park being built near where the cluster mailboxes will be moved. We reached out to the SID Board's chairman, Kurt Meisinger, for an update on the mailbox move and the dog park proposal.

"We have not taken any addition steps towards the formal creation of a dog park with all the necessary amenities," Kurt said. "It is still part of the long-term plan, but we want to get the parking lot finished first. We also are looking for community involvement in looking at fundraising for the actual park amenities so the cost doesn't have to be solely carried by the taxpayers.

"The mailboxes will be moved once OPPD installs the two lights for the parking lot. The lot will receive street lights similar to those that are currently in use at the entrance. At our last meeting, we were informed that OPPD had assigned an engineer to the project, but we didn't have any estimates on completion. We feel it would not be safe to move the mailboxes without proper lighting."

Wildlife harassment doesn't bother geese

As our Buc Bay residents well know, it's difficult to ruffle the feathers of a Canada goose. That's what researchers from the University of Illinois discovered when they tested the effectiveness of winter harassment techniques to drive Canada geese to leave sites in urban Chicago.

Wildlife harassment is a nonlethal management technique that encourages animals to move on from an area by increasing a location's sense of risk and danger. It's used to manage Canada geese in cities where the birds can clash with people for a number of reasons, from fouling green spaces with their droppings to colliding with aircraft.

The study's researchers harassed Canada geese by approaching the animals on foot and ATVs and then clacking lumber boards together. They expected that the harassment would be more effective at dispersing geese during the challenging winter season. But, surprisingly, the researchers found that harassment was ineffective at significantly changing the behavior of geese and had diminishing returns over time.

Callaway's new clubs ready









Recipe of the month

Cream of Mushroom Chicken

yield: 4 SERVINGS prep time: 5 MINUTES cook time: 10 MINUTES total time: 15 MINUTES

Ingredients

» 1 1/4 lbs. boneless, skinless thin-cut chicken breasts or tenders

» 1 tablespoon vegetable oil

» ½ teaspoon garlic powder

» 1 can (100z) cream of mushroom soup

» Salt and pepper, to taste

» Noodles, rice or mashed potatoes for serving



Instructions

1. In a large skillet heat the oil over medium heat. Season the chicken with garlic powder, salt and pepper.

2. Brown the chicken on both sides until golden, about 2 minutes.

3. Add the cream of mushroom soup and spread over the top.

When soup begins to bubble, cover pan, lower heat to a simmer and cook for 5-10 minutes, or until cooked through.

Serve over noodles, rice or mashed potatoes.

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SID#5 Covenants - Architectural Control

The Buccaneer Bay Architectural Control process of reviewing requests for changes on your property is now being managed by Teresa Dilts and Kayla Graff. They will be working with Mike Jensen, Cass County Zoning Administrator.

There are 8 sets of Covenants for Buccaneer Bay. It seems like every time a new section of Buccaneer Bay opened up another set of covenants was made. I try to make sure that every resident in Buccaneer Bay gets a copy of the covenants that is for their section of the neighborhood. Some realtors will provide a copy of the covenants to the buyer, but I don't think all of them do. Most of the covenants have some sort of termination clause.

All sets of covenants are filed at the Register of Deeds office at the Court House. Not all of the covenants have the same number of years that the covenants are in force.

HILLS COVENANTS in the second section titled: **"AMENDED DECLARATION OF COVENANTS, CONDITIONS AND RESTRICTIONS"**, which covers the following: These covenants shall run with the land and be binding upon the current and future Owners of all Lots in Blocks One (1) through Six (6), inclusive; all Lots in Blocks Fifteen (15) through Twenty (20), inclusive; Lots one (1) through Five (5) in Block Seven (7), and; Lot Ten (10) in Block Fourteen (14), all in Buccaneer Bay, a subdivision as surveyed, platted and recorded in Cass County, Nebraska, until the year 2029, together with any Lots created by a replat of these Lots, and shall be continued for successive periods of twenty-five (25) years unless sooner modified or terminated in writing by seventy-five percent (75%) or more of the then record owners of the Properties, with one vote per Lot.

BAY LAKE COVENANTS in the second section titled: **"AMENDED DECLARATION OF COVENANTS, CONDITIONS AND RESTRICTIONS"**, which covers the following Blocks: Block 21, 22, 23, 24, and 26 until the year 2000, at which time the covenants shall be extended for *successive terms* of 25 years, which should make them good until 2025.

Block 31 in Buccaneer Bay incudes Windward Dr. and all side streets in this section, approved in September 2008 for term of 25 years, which would then expire in 2033.

Blk 28 Lots 8A/B, Lots 9A/B, and Lot 10 on Lakeside Dr. These first 2 townhomes and one house are under the original covenants for Lakeside Dr. approved May 18, 2005 for a term of 25 years, which should terminate in 2030.

Blk 28, Lots 1A – 24B, minus Lots 8A/B, 9A/B and Lot 10 on Lakeside Dr. as described in the Covenants from Lone Tree Holdings. Approved May 18, 2017 for a term of 30 years, which would terminate in 2047.

Bucc Bay 1st Edition – Lots 1R – 39R – Davy Jones Dr. and Davy Jones Cir. Filed February 14, 1996 for a term of 25 years, which would expire in *February 2021, if not renewed*.

Blk 29 Lots 1-26 Fairway Cir., Blk 30 Lots 1-6 – Fairway Dr. – Covenants and restrictions shall run with and bind the land and for a term of twenty-five years. Filed May 18th, 2005, which would expire in 2030.

Blk 27 Lots 1A – 20B, and Lots 21 – 62 – Sailboat Lake – The Covenants and restrictions shall run with and bind the land for a term of 25 years. Filed December 23, 1996, which would expire in *December 2021, if not renewed*.

Residents under the covenants that will be expiring can be renewed by having residents who want to have the covenants continue review and update them. Each set of covenants has a specification of how many signatures are required to approve the revised covenants. It has been done, but it takes a lot of work. Once the covenants are out of date, that section of residents will no longer have to follow any restrictions for their section.

Note: The process below may be modified as the Newsletter and Welcome Packages are being updated.

Each time a new resident moves in they receive a Welcome Package that has a copy of the covenants for their location. The information on new residents come in an email from Peoples Service. Jill Bobenhouse-Teaser will take on putting the Welcome Packages together and provide the packages to the appropriate Block Captain so the new resident can fill out a Data Sheet to be sent to one of the members taking over for Janet. The changes will require the new information to be added to the Buccaneer Bay Phone Directory, if the new resident approves, and update the Block Captains list as residents move in and out.


