# Plattsmouth native loves Buc Bay

In 1965, Plattsmouth native Dave Nielsen became the first boy from Plattsmouth High School to be appointed to the U.S. Air Force Academy. But, as he vividly recalls, it wasn't part of his planned vision of the future. Collecting baseball trading cards, however, was a hobby he picked up early, and it continues to keep him busy in retirement. (Much more on that later.)

During those formative high school years, Dave mapped out a plan to attend the University of Nebraska in Lincoln and become a photographer. The seeds for the Academy experience were planted after Dave saw his first Nebraska football game. The Huskers opponent that day in 1963 was the Air Force Academy. NU's only loss that season came at that game (17-13).

"We were driving home," Dave said, "and my dad said, 'What did you think about that Air Force bunch? Would you like to go to school there?' I said, 'Yeah, I guess.' And he said he'd get the paperwork started."

After his dad submitted the necessary documents, **60-plus y** Dave received a letter from then-Congressman Glenn Cunningham notifying him he was a fifth-alternate to become a West Point Army cadet. That didn't appeal to him.

Meanwhile, Dave intended to enroll at Nebraska and get a job with National Geographic and see the world.

"Time went on," he said, "and I got a another telegram from Cunningham telling me I was second alternate for the Air Force Academy. It got to two weeks before the reporting date, and two Air Force guys showed up on the porch."

Dave was asked if he wore glasses, and he told them he had 20-20 vision. As it turned out, the others ahead of him in the application process were disqualified because they wore corrective lenses. That put Dave on top of the list, and he had 24 hours to decide on the Academy.

At first, he told his parents that he didn't want to accept the appointment.

"My dad said, 'This is an honor. You don't realize you'd be the first one from your school to go there.' I said, 'Yeah, maybe, but

I don't think that military stuff is for me. I want to be a journalist.'

Dave's dad informed him that his college education would be "free," and, best of all, he'd learn how to fly jets. He also told his son that by going to the Academy he wouldn't have to worry about being drafted into the military. After sleeping on it, Dave agreed to accept the nomination, but he did so less than willingly and with some trepidation.

"I didn't have any military background," Dave said. "It was tough for me. It was hell on wheels. That first summer was pretty physical."

As the years went on, the physical challenges eased a bit, but the academic portion got harder each year. Dave took as many as 26 credit hours each semester.

"You're talking electrical engineering, physics, astronomics," Dave said. "Those were not easy courses. At first I struggled. I

wanted to run away. I was going to go to California and jump into the hippy life. But I stayed and ended up at the top of my class. It was misery for everybody."

After graduation, Dave attended pilot school at Vance Air Force Base in Enid, Oklahoma. He graduated fourth in his class. The first plane he flew was a T-41, a single-engine prop. He eventually flew a full-size jet, just like those you'll see flying around Offutt Air Force Base.

At first, Dave had thoughts of becoming a fighter pilot. But so

did everybody else in his class. When it became obvious he wouldn't be flying an F-4 fighter jet, he chose a EC-135 jet and was sent to Grissom Air Force base near Kokomo, Indiana, after finishing pilot school in 1970.

Dave originally had a five-year commitment to the Air Force after graduation, but he served an additional year to become a pilot evaluator.

"I was moving up pretty good," he said. "I moved over from copilot to aircraft commander and then to instructor pilot. I only lacked one thing for being a successful Air Force officer, and that was not having a good Air Force wife. She hated the military."

Dave's first marriage didn't work out, and the couple with three kids divorced after leaving the military. He applied for work at Mutual of Omaha as a young executive but was advised to return to school and obtain a law degree, making him more valuable to the company.

So that's what he did, commuting from Plattsmouth to classes at Creighton. He graduated in 1978 near the top of his class. While in law school, he clerked for the McGrath North law firm. He ended up working there for 20 years and eventually went into private practice.

Once his divorce was final, he met his current wife, Mary. They began married life in 2008 living in Plattsmouth. They eventually moved to an acreage near Murray, where they lived for eight years.

Dave agreed that it was too lonely in the country, so the hunt began about a year ago for a new home. They fell in love with their current home off Buccaneer Boulevard.

That meant moving all the contents from the farm home — including Dave's massive baseball card collection. With baseball being his favorite sport, it only made sense that Dave started collecting cards as a youngster.

But, as many kids did back in his day, he often attached cards to the spokes of his bicycle with a clothes pin to produce a sound that made the bike sound almost like a motorcycle. Of course, that practice destroyed the cards.

"I was born in 1947," he said. "In 1955, I had a paper route, and when I'd get my money every week I would buy a Donald Duck comic book and some baseball cards. I didn't really care for the gum that much, but that's how I started my collection."

As Dave got older, in 1975 to be exact, he came up with the idea of collecting cards of players who became enshrined into the Major League Baseball Hall of Fame.

Dave's biggest thrill in his youth was meeting his favorite player, Mickey Mantle, in 1961. Today, he has that framed autographed photo made out to him hanging on the wall.

Years later, Dave had a chance to meet former Yankee standout Bob Cerv, who was nearing the end of his life at a Wahoo rest home. Cerv graciously autographed his card for Dave.

During all the years away from home, his parents didn't disturb his collection.

He estimates that by the time he was in high school, he had picked up around 3,000 cards. In his current home, he has them filed in alphabetic order so he can easily find them.

So what does he intend to do when he gets to a point of passing down his collection? Dave said it'll go to one of his 16 grand-children who shares his passion for card collecting.

When not tending to his hobby, he and Mary are enjoying life in Buccaneer Bay and getting to know more neighbors.

"I feel like we live in a tree house here," Dave said. "Deer come out, about six or eight, and we get turkeys coming through. There's a pesky raccoon that comes out about every night.

"Mary loves birds. She puts feeders out. We really like it here."

## Summer's here: Conserve water

Editor's note: For those who missed this in last month's newsletter, here's the Buc Bay water policy (it's worth repeating):

The Lawn and Landscaping Watering Policy has been in effect for several years but was never enforced. Why enforce the policy now?

As the population of the District has grown so has the demand on our water system, especially during the summer months. The demand on our wells was at an all-time high in the summer of 2021, and several new residences have been built since then which will increase the demand even more. To reduce the peak demands on our system and extend the life of our wells; the District must start enforcing this policy.

The Water Conservation Plan outlines the Lawn and Landscaping Watering Policy for the District is in effect from May 1 through Sept. 30.

Even numbered addresses may water lawns and landscaping only on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday. Odd numbered addresses may water lawns and landscaping only on Wednesday, Friday and Sunday.

Watering lawns or landscaping is not allowed on Monday.

If the property owner waters the lawn and landscaping only with a reclamation system or the owner's private sand point well, and does not use the District's water system, the owner is exempt from these rules and regulations.

Homeowners that have planted a new lawn from seed or have planted new sod are exempt for 30 days from the date of planting.

Residents violating the *Lawn and Landscaping Watering Policy* are subject to the following enforcement actions:

1st violation: written warning.

2nd violation: **\$50.00** Water Service Fee applied to the next month's water bill.

3rd and subsequent violations: a \$100.00 Water Service Fee

# Signs help beautify golf course

On May 17, 2022, Pam and Wayne Petersen took on the project of planting the flower beds between holes 1 and 10 on the Bay Hills Golf Course. Pam had starter plants from her house in Council Bluffs (spiderwort), and they picked up other plants (salvia and yarrow) from a nursery in Fremont. In addition, a white ground cover was donated by Brendan and Kelly Linse, former Bay Hills residents.

The plants looked scrawny at first, but with a little time and effort they took off as hoped. Clearing the area (thank you, Steve Bognar), planting, weeding, and rototilling (thanks, Jim Chastain) transformed this space once filled with bushes into a garden.

In September 2022, Pam, Wayne and Joe Dyess were pondering about what could be placed in the flower beds between holes 1 and 10 on the course. They brainstormed and came up with directional signs from golf courses around the world. They had a plan.

Joe spent the fall of 2022 coming up with plans for the direc-



tional signs. He methodically chose the golf courses around the world, putting them in the correct directions and with the correct mileage from the Bay Hills Golf Club. Joe drafted several plans to incorporate a welcome sign and then went to the county office and discovered that Bay Hills was founded on Sept. 5, 1974.

Wayne and Joe took the concept to Metal Logos and spoke with Andy Dubbs, the owner. Andy is the son of the late Sandy Dubbs Hefner, a former Bay Hills member and resident. (Sandy's design logo work can be seen throughout the Bay Hills clubhouse.) Andy was excited

about the project. In fact, he put Trish Lortz in charge of getting the signs completed. Trish was an avid golfer at Bay Hills Golf Club for many years.

Metal Logos went above and beyond and donated all the signs and labor. The signs were completed by Metal Logos in March



2023 — good timing for the upcoming golf season.

Joe started laying out the plans on how to get the signs mounted in the ground. That led to Jay Sorensen donating the metal poles to which the signs are attached. He borrowed Scott Lane's trailer, then Jay recruited the assistance of Scottie Lauenroth to transport the metal poles to Bay Hills. Jim Price chipped in by donating the wooden poles for the larger signs. Months of planning were coming together.

Neighbors Piers and Jean Banks on hole No. 10, let Wayne and Joe borrow extension cords and their electricity to cut the metal poles. Joe and Wayne got the location of the signs approved by owner, Steve Bogner, and Director of Golf, Damon Wagner. They asked Vince Bruce to help them execute the plans of installing the signs. Joe and Vince rented and transported the auger. Those two and Wayne drilled three holes in the flower beds. It took several days, and with the drying of the cement, both signs were vertical on May 31, 2023.

The theme for the garden area is patriotic – red, white and blue plants along with a bald eagle sitting on top of the "Welcome to Bay Hills" sign. (Pam says that if you think the spiderwort is purple and not blue, you simply need to squint when you look at it. It does make a difference.)

The plants from May 2022 blossomed with all their beauty in one year. It was like it was meant to be, for the signs to be completed right around Memorial Day!

Special thanks to Daryl Hubbell for providing water and golf carts for this project and to others who assisted in this undertaking.

It took a village to bring this project from start to finish. It is the evidence of the power of community and shared effort.

## College World Series: Fun for all

The Men's College World Series ended its annual run last month, and it was another exciting tournament. The series was first played in Omaha in 1950, and the only year it wasn't staged was 2020 when COVID-19 caused cancellation of the event.

I remember attending my first CWS as a youngster in the mid-1960s. Our three sons grew up watching the best college baseball teams compete at Rosenblatt Stadium. Attendance grew each



year to the point where fans actually were allowed to stand on the warning track down each line.


By the 1990s, it became clear that Rosenblatt wasn't able to accommo-

date the massive crowds — even after a series of seating expansions over the years. The city agreed to a demand by the NCAA that Omaha build a new stadium, and in exchange the contract would be extended 25 years to 2035. Some fans voiced their opposition to that ultimatum.

The move didn't come without some controversy as many "old-timers" preferred the cozy, nostalgic Rosenblatt over a "sterile" new park. I had mixed feelings. I had so many memories of great games and tailgating on Row J of the parking lot.

But most folks realized that to keep the CWS in Omaha, keeping Rosenblatt wasn't an option. Friends of ours who had season tickets for years vowed not to watch another CWS at the new venue. I'm guessing they weren't alone.

My first impression of the new park reminded me of many of the Major League Baseball stadiums I've visited although on a bit of a smaller scale. The concourse is much wider that Rosenblatt's, and there are no beams restricting the view from some of the old

park's grandstand seats. Another nice addition came when the NCAA gave the green light to the sale of beer and wine.

Beginning in 1988, CBS got the contract to televise the championship game, and it always took place on Saturday afternoon, and the NCAA took home a hefty rights fee of about \$500,000. But in the event the title contest was rained out, the network said it wouldn't air the make-up game, so an insurance policy was taken out to make sure the rights fee would be covered.

I recall during one year while working in the World-Herald sports department, perhaps 1991, the Friday-night game was played in a steady rain. I was sent to interview then-tournament director Dennis Pope with instructions to ask if the NCAA was endangering players to make sure the Friday game was completed to allow the championship to take place the next day.

The game was delayed a couple of times to sprinkle "diamond dust" around the mound and bases. Pope assured me the field was playable, but to me and others I spoke with, we disagreed. Pitchers were having trouble with their footing, but the game did get completed.

Another memory came long before I was hired by the World-Herald. It was 1980, and I was into my first full year with the downtown Omaha law firm of Kutak Rock.

I received a call from the sports information director at Creighton, the host institution. I was asked if I'd be interested in being official scorer for the CWS. Not only would I have a media pass, it was a paying gig. I asked my boss if it was OK to slip out early when needed, and he gave me the green light.

Arizona defeated Hawaii 5-3 in the championship game, and I scored every inning of every game. But some of the doubleheaders went long into the night, and I often wouldn't get home until after midnight.

After leaving the paper, I had the chance to work with my good friend and former W-H colleague Eric Olson, who still works for the Associated Press. Those were good times.

## In my opinion, everyone should learn how to play the guitar.


- ✓ As a hobby, playing the guitar is a great way to pass the time.

## Medal of Honor for Highway 20

Three years ago, the Nebraska Department of Transportation unveiled two new signs that designate U.S. Highway 20 as the "Nebraska Medal of Honor Highway."

President Darryl Harrison said the project is one of the most honorable things he has ever been a part of. He said everyone who has worked on the project has been passionate about honoring medal of honor recipients.

"When we talk about medal of honor recipients there is nothing higher, not in the world of the military," Harrison said. "Everyone working on this project has been such a joy to be around. I have been so blessed just to be around such wonderful people."

Nebraska became the fifth state to formally adopt the Medal of Honor name for U.S. 20, which stretches across the northern portion of the state. The highway starts in Newport, Oregon. and ends in Boston, Massachusetts.

The Medal of Honor is the United States' highest award for military valor in action.

Celebration events and signs commemorating the new name took place across Nebraska.

About two-thirds of all 3,508 Medal of Honor awards given since 1863 are connected with the 12 states connecting Highway 20: Oregon, Idaho, Montana, Wyoming, Nebraska, Iowa, Illinois, Indiana, Ohio, Pennsylvania, New York and Massachusetts.

## Be kind to our hummingbirds




Editor's note: Buc Bay neighbor Sandy Rhoades wanted to share some information about the feeding of hummingbirds. Here's what she's passing along:

I notice that many people who live here are not educated about feeding hummingbirds. If guidelines are not followed our dear friends get a fungus from the nectar, and they will die. Feeders should be out of the sun and changed every other or third day. Homemade nectar works great, and food color is not necessary. It is so much fun to watch them, but we need to provide a healthy meal for our feathered friends.

Always use refined white sugar (regular table sugar). Never use honey, corn syrup or raw, unprocessed sugars. Powdered sugar (also called confectioners' sugar) often contains additional ingredients, such as cornstarch. Therefore, it is not recommended for use in creating hummingbird food.





## SID#5 Covenants - Architectural Control

The Buccaneer Bay Architectural Control process of reviewing requests for changes on your property is now being managed by Teresa Dilts and Kayla Graff. They will be working with Mike Jensen, Cass County Zoning Administrator.

There are 8 sets of Covenants for Buccaneer Bay. It seems like every time a new section of Buccaneer Bay opened up another set of covenants was made. I try to make sure that every resident in Buccaneer Bay gets a copy of the covenants that is for their section of the neighborhood. Some realtors will provide a copy of the covenants to the buyer, but I don't think all of them do. Most of the covenants have some sort of termination clause.

All sets of covenants are filed at the Register of Deeds office at the Court House. Not all of the covenants have the same number of years that the covenants are in force.

HILLS COVENANTS in the second section titled: "AMENDED DECLARATION OF COVENANTS, CONDITIONS AND RESTRICTIONS", which covers the following: These covenants shall run with the land and be binding upon the current and future Owners of all Lots in Blocks One (1) through Six (6), inclusive; all Lots in Blocks Fifteen (15) through Twenty (20), inclusive; Lots one (1) through Five (5) in Block Seven (7), and; Lot Ten (10) in Block Fourteen (14), all in Buccaneer Bay, a subdivision as surveyed, platted and recorded in Cass County, Nebraska, until the year 2029, together with any Lots created by a replat of these Lots, and shall be continued for successive periods of twenty-five (25) years unless sooner modified or terminated in writing by seventy-five percent (75%) or more of the then record owners of the Properties, with one vote per Lot.

BAY LAKE COVENANTS in the second section titled: "AMENDED DECLARATION OF COVENANTS, CONDITIONS AND RESTRICTIONS", which covers the following Blocks: Block 21, 22, 23, 24, and 26 until the year 2000, at which time the covenants shall be extended for *successive terms* of 25 years, which should make them good until 2025.

**Block 31 in Buccaneer Bay** incudes Windward Dr. and all side streets in this section, approved in September 2008 for term of 25 years, which would then expire in 2033.

Blk 28 Lots 8A/B, Lots 9A/B, and Lot 10 on Lakeside Dr. These first 2 townhomes and one house are under the original covenants for Lakeside Dr. approved May 18, 2005 for a term of 25 years, which should terminate in 2030.

Blk 28, Lots 1A – 24B, minus Lots 8A/B, 9A/B and Lot 10 on Lakeside Dr. as described in the Covenants from Lone Tree Holdings. Approved May 18, 2017 for a term of 30 years, which would terminate in 2047.

**Bucc Bay 1st Edition – Lots 1R – 39R** – Davy Jones Dr. and Davy Jones Cir. Filed February 14, 1996 for a term of 25 years. These Covenants have expired.

Blk 29 Lots 1-26 Fairway Cir., Blk 30 Lots 1-6 – Fairway Dr. – Covenants and restrictions shall run with and bind the land and for a term of twenty-five years. Filed May 18th, 2005, which would expire in 2030.

Blk 27 Lots 1A – 20B, and Lots 21 – 62 – Sailboat Lake – The Covenants and restrictions shall run with and bind the land for a term of 25 years. Filed December 23, 1996, the Covenants have been renewed.

Residents under the covenants that will be expiring can be renewed by having residents who want to have the covenants continue review and update them. Each set of covenants has a specification of how many signatures are required to approve the revised covenants. It has been done, but it takes a lot of work. Once the covenants are out of date, that section of residents will no longer have to follow any restrictions for their section.

Note: The process below may be modified as the Newsletter and Welcome Packages are being updated.

Each time a new resident moves in they receive a Welcome Package that has a copy of the covenants for their location. The information on new residents come in an email from Peoples Service. Jill Bobenhouse-Teaser will take on putting the Welcome Packages together and provide the packages to the appropriate Block Captain so the new resident can fill out a Data Sheet to be sent to one of the members taking over for Janet. The changes will require the new information to be added to the Buccaneer Bay Phone Directory, if the new resident approves, and update the Block Captains list as residents move in and out.


