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Getting to know Buc Bay residents

Music plays a big role in his life

It's safe to say that Robert Brutus traveled the farthest to get to Buccaneer Bay. He grew up in Haiti, which is more than 2,000 miles from Nebraska. Growing up, he became acquainted with a woman who was a missionary from Nebraska, and that's what inspired him to move to America in his late teens. He had no idea where the state was.

Even though Haiti was not as financially solid as the United States, Robert wants to give credit to "the greatest man that ever lived," his father, Ornil, who made all the financial sacrifices to obtain the necessary first-year tuition for him to attend a private school, Union College.

Today he's retired and living on Ridgeway Road and enjoying life as a music instructor under the name Uncle Bob. He and his wife, Phyllis, of more than 40 years, moved into the Buc Bay neighborhood three years ago.

Robert made the move to Nebraska and enrolled at Lincoln's Union College, a private Seventh-day Adventist school. His original plan was to attend medical school but found out it was quite expensive. So with computers just arriving, he elected to study computer science.

It was then that he met Phyllis, and today the couple has four daughters and eight grandchildren.

After getting his degree, Robert was employed by the state of Nebraska. He then switched to become a consultant on computer programming.

"My first job was on a project for Microsoft," he said. "That was in Omaha, and it was very successful."

From there, Robert moved on to a position with First Data in Omaha. In the late 1990s, the family moved to Elkhorn.

Robert's grandson Samuel, son of daughter Rachel, (who had neuroblastoma cancer) and some of her other children had been going in and out of hospital, which triggered him to move to Washington State to help Rachel.

"Rachel had some issues herself with Multiple Sclerosis," Robert recalled. "She needed our help."

Robert began playing the guitar at around age 14, and he also learned to play the piano while attending college in Lincoln. He took the lessons from the father of the woman he met while living in Haiti.

Years later, he became the author of a book titled "Frantic Souls," which was published earlier this year. In 2012, he co-authored a book titled "Help and Hope for Haiti," which was written by Rubens Pamies, M.D., former chancellor at the University of Nebraska Medical Center.

Long before then, he concentrated on improving his guitarplaying skills.

"When I first started," he said, "I didn't have any teachers, so it was very hard for me."

But once he felt comfortable with the instrument, he began playing before crowds.

"When I go to church, I give concerts with my guitar," he said. "It was my goal to do that."

"I have a few students from here," he said. "I have one lady from the area, and she's doing well. She comes every week. She's making a lot of progress."

tors students online.

He has a daughter who lives in Bellevue, and that's how he learned about Buccaneer Bay. But first, Robert and Phyllis put in an offer on a house in Lincoln.

"We found this one at the last minute," he said. "We got it right away."

Like many Buc Bay residents, Robert and Phyllis enjoy the neighborhood for its peacefulness and the occasional sightings of wildlife.

"What I like about the area," Robert said, "is that the people are very nice. We know our neighbors and talk to them all the time. They're all very courteous. Before we had the fence put in, we had deer in the yard all the time."

Robert enjoys working with students who range from quite young to older.

"For girls or boys, a good age would be around 14," he said. "That's when they can really understand. I don't cram theory all the time on them. I give them the freedom. If they don't want to play classical music, I have an electric guitar in my closet they can use if they want to play country music or whatever they like.

"When they study music the way they're supposed to, it's much easier for them to switch to a different genre. They can have good foundations."

Here's the scoop on cicada killers

Mild mannered female cicada killer wasps are active across parts of America during the summer, intent on their tasks of 1) digging underground burrows and 2) provisioning them with paralyzed cicadas that will be food for their grub-like larvae. The wasps will be very focused on these tasks for several weeks.

Tall grass does not seem to keep them from locating the entrance.

Why are cicada killers so abundant in some areas? These solitary wasps choose sites with specific characteristics: well-drained, light-textured soils in full sunlight that are near trees harboring cicadas. They may dig along sidewalk or patio edges, in flower beds, gardens or lawns. As much as 100 cubic inches of soil may be brought to the surface as tunnels are formed. This can be unsightly in highly managed turf and the accumulations may smother grass. Sometimes skunks may dig up areas that have been extensively tunneled by the wasps to feed on cicadas and wasp larvae.

Large aggregations of cicada killers can build up over time. An estimated 40 percent of the developing larvae (a dozen or more per tunnel) may emerge as adults the following year so numbers can increase rapidly.

Are cicada killers dangerous? Females have significant stingers which they plunge into cicadas to inject venom that paralyzes them. Without doubt, their stings are painful. However, they are not aggressive and do not have nest-guarding instinct of honey bees and hornets. You can walk through areas where they are active without attracting attention.

The buzzing noise that the wasps make and the warning colors on their wings and bodies intimidate and discourage predators that see them as a large meal. When attacked, females will use their stinger to protect themselves.

Males lack stingers but are territorial. They will approach anything that enters "their area," including walkers, people mowing or using weed-eaters, or riding tractors. They may hover and challenge trespassers but are harmless. That can be easy to forget when staring down a big wasp.

Will cicada killers harm pets? Some dogs and cats may catch cicada killers but usually only once. Those that pick females probably will be stung, remember it, and associate the experience with the buzzing sound and warning colors.

Some may have a severe reaction to the venom, especially if stung in the mouth. If that is suspected, the animal should be taken to a veterinarian immediately. Wasp flight begins in early morning and can continue

until dusk. Wasps remain in their burrows at night so encounters can be avoided by managing the activity of the pet.

Can cicada killers cause damage?

Female cicada killers dig extensive tunnels where their young will be raised, displacing several pounds of soil in the process. Occasionally, it can result in some damage, such destabilizing a brick patio laid on sand. This is an instance when control may be needed.

Cicada killers may dig in the loose soil in vegetable gardens or flower beds. A burrow at the base of a plant may disrupt its root system. If only a few plants are affected, drenching the area around their bases with water is probably the best approach. The wasps do not like wet soil so they may abandon the site. Watering the plants thoroughly will settle soil back around the roots, giving them a chance to survive. Do not drench soil around plants with an insecticide mix because it may damage the roots and/or result in a residue in the plant. Cicada killers may begin to dig in sandy areas on playgrounds or in golf course sand traps. If practical, keep these areas wet or regularly churn the sand to discourage wasps from establishing their tunnels.



SID#5 Covenants - Architectural Control

The Buccaneer Bay Architectural Control process of reviewing requests for changes on your property is now being managed by Teresa Dilts and Kayla Graff. They will be working with Mike Jensen, Cass County Zoning Administrator.

There are 8 sets of Covenants for Buccaneer Bay. It seems like every time a new section of Buccaneer Bay opened up another set of covenants was made. I try to make sure that every resident in Buccaneer Bay gets a copy of the covenants that is for their section of the neighborhood. Some realtors will provide a copy of the covenants to the buyer, but I don't think all of them do. Most of the covenants have some sort of termination clause.

All sets of covenants are filed at the Register of Deeds office at the Court House. Not all of the covenants have the same number of years that the covenants are in force.

HILLS COVENANTS in the second section titled: "AMENDED DECLARATION OF COVENANTS, CONDITIONS AND RESTRICTIONS", which covers the following: These covenants shall run with the land and be binding upon the current and future Owners of all Lots in Blocks One (1) through Six (6), inclusive; all Lots in Blocks Fifteen (15) through Twenty (20), inclusive; Lots one (1) through Five (5) in Block Seven (7), and; Lot Ten (10) in Block Fourteen (14), all in Buccaneer Bay, a subdivision as surveyed, platted and recorded in Cass County, Nebraska, until the year 2029, together with any Lots created by a replat of these Lots, and shall be continued for successive periods of twenty-five (25) years unless sooner modified or terminated in writing by seventy-five percent (75%) or more of the then record owners of the Properties, with one vote per Lot.

BAY LAKE COVENANTS in the second section titled: "AMENDED DECLARATION OF COVENANTS, CONDITIONS AND RESTRICTIONS", which covers the following Blocks: Block 21, 22, 23, 24, and 26 until the year 2000, at which time the covenants shall be extended for *successive terms* of 25 years, which should make them good until 2025.

Block 31 in Buccaneer Bay incudes Windward Dr. and all side streets in this section, approved in September 2008 for term of 25 years, which would then expire in 2033.

Blk 28 Lots 8A/B, Lots 9A/B, and Lot 10 on Lakeside Dr. These first 2 townhomes and one house are under the original covenants for Lakeside Dr. approved May 18, 2005 for a term of 25 years, which should terminate in 2030.

Blk 28, Lots 1A – 24B, minus Lots 8A/B, 9A/B and Lot 10 on Lakeside Dr. as described in the Covenants from Lone Tree Holdings. Approved May 18, 2017 for a term of 30 years, which would terminate in 2047.

Bucc Bay 1st Edition – Lots 1R – 39R – Davy Jones Dr. and Davy Jones Cir. Filed February 14, 1996 for a term of 25 years. These Covenants have expired.

Blk 29 Lots 1-26 Fairway Cir., Blk 30 Lots 1-6 – Fairway Dr. – Covenants and restrictions shall run with and bind the land and for a term of twenty-five years. Filed May 18th, 2005, which would expire in 2030.

Blk 27 Lots 1A – 20B, and Lots 21 – 62 – Sailboat Lake – The Covenants and restrictions shall run with and bind the land for a term of 25 years. Filed December 23, 1996, the Covenants have been renewed.

Residents under the covenants that will be expiring can be renewed by having residents who want to have the covenants continue review and update them. Each set of covenants has a specification of how many signatures are required to approve the revised covenants. It has been done, but it takes a lot of work. Once the covenants are out of date, that section of residents will no longer have to follow any restrictions for their section.

Note: The process below may be modified as the Newsletter and Welcome Packages are being updated.

Each time a new resident moves in they receive a Welcome Package that has a copy of the covenants for their location. The information on new residents come in an email from Peoples Service. Jill Bobenhouse-Teaser will take on putting the Welcome Packages together and provide the packages to the appropriate Block Captain so the new resident can fill out a Data Sheet to be sent to one of the members taking over for Janet. The changes will require the new information to be added to the Buccaneer Bay Phone Directory, if the new resident approves, and update the Block Captains list as residents move in and out.
