Flowers brighten their exterior

Hospital (which in 1997 merged with the Nebraska Medicine campus). She's been there ever since. Her official title now is surgical purchasing senior analyst. She's charged with purchasing the hospital's surgical instruments and capital equipment. Last June marked her 44th year there.

During Todd's years working in irrigation, both fulltime and as a side job, he got to admire other folks' landscaping flower gardens. As their home was being built here, he had a vision for the back overlooking Sailboat Lake. He installed a rock wall that he insisted would have a natural look to it.

Finding flowers often was easy while servicing irrigation systems. Many gladly offered to part ways with them.

"I'd rip up flowers

and bring them home," Todd said. "Our La Vista home was flowered out."

Many of those flowers from their first home can be found in the backyard of their current one. Todd also made several purchases at Lowe's and Menards when he saw bargains.

"I guess it's my hobby," he said. "I don't have any other hobbies other than fishing. My main hobby is my yard. It gives me something to do."

Said Kathy: "He's very passionate about it, very dedicated. He's out there every day as people who drive by have seen him manicuring the yard and the flowers. I'm just so proud of him for all the things he's established to make our home look so pretty."

Their collection continues to grow each year with flowers from literally all over the world. And, as you might suspect, it takes a lot of water to keep them all looking good. Their water bill from May's record-setting lack of precipitation was \$300.

"I don't want anything to happen to the flowers," Todd said. "The grass will recover if it's dry, but the flowers won't."

Folks have noticed their colorful collection.

"They drive by real slow," Kathy said, "and some people, even from out of town, have stopped and knocked on our door. Some of them are looking for new ideas for their homes."

Said Todd: "There was a lady the other day who stopped while I was outside. She said, 'I go by your house all the time and see how pretty your flowers are.' Another lady brought me a flower as a gift, and I planted it. Four years later, her daughter stopped by, and we showed it to her."

Todd and Kathy have enjoyed meeting new people since settling in. Life in Buccaneer Bay, Kathy said, is the best.

"It's very peaceful here," she said. "The island (on Sailboat Lake) is our neighbor."

Added Todd: "I think the whole area is great. I've never met one bad person. Every person is very giving here. Everybody in the neighborhood is nice."

ATVs not designed for youngsters

Editor's note: There have been sightings of young people driving ATVs, and there have been inquiries regarding the legality of operating them. Here's what was found online from the Cass County Sheriff's Office:

Recreational vehicles such as ATVs are not designed for use on public roads because they are not as stable as cars or trucks and don't have the same safety features, according to a statement issued last month by the Sheriff's Office. This makes them more dangerous for underage drivers, who are less experienced.

The dangers of accidents involving recreational vehicles commonly include collisions, overturning and ejections. Those accidents "can happen in an instant" with devastating consequences, the Sheriff's Office said.

"We are asking you to please talk to your children about the dangers, laws and rules relating to driving recreational vehicles," the statement continued. "We realize some of you may think even though it is illegal, your underage child is mature enough to drive these vehicles on a roadway safely. Underage recreational vehicle drivers and their parents can both face consequences for driving on public roadways."

Underage drivers could be detained, fined and the vehicle be impounded. Parents could be held liable for any damages relating to their illegal driving.

The Sheriff's Office said it knows that enforcement of the regulations could be unpopular, but said the life-saving benefits outweigh that risk.

"We would rather risk being unpopular with a small group of golf cart, ATV and UTV owners and drivers for our prevention efforts than work a tragic accident, especially an accident involving an underage child," the Sheriff's Office said. "That's why we're asking you to please talk to your children about the dangers of underage and illegal use of recreational vehicles."

The legal requirements for use of ATVs, UTVs and golf carts include: a licensed driver at least 16 years of age; a 36-inch

minimum distance off the ground, registration with the city and displaying of plates/stickers; valid insurance for the vehicle.

"We know that you love and care for your children, and we do, too," the Sheriff's Office said. "Please help us keep our children safe by following the law and not allowing underage drivers to operate recreational vehicles. It could save their life."

Those smiles you saw on the faces of the area mothers at the end of last month came from sending their kids back to school. For some students, it's their last year of high school. Though it was more than 50 years ago for me, I still remember looking forward to my senior year at Papillion High School.

I was eagerly anticipating the next step in my life, college. I was about to be the first — and only — of the four Fey kids to go beyond high school, and I made up my mind a couple years before graduation that I would enroll at Wayne State College.



But at that time, I hadn't started dating my future wife, Shirley. Once she learned of my plan to start college at Wayne, she decided to follow me there. My senior year of high school shot by — mostly because

my main focus was on the social part, not the classwork.

I only had four classes — all in the morning — which freed up my afternoons. Most days, I worked at the Papillion Times, which added more fuel to my desire to someday work for the Omaha World-Herald.

Around 3 o'clock each school day came practice for whatever sport was in season. I was the head student manager for the football team, which gave me an up-close view of each game. Papillion High was in its second year of competing in Class A, but our teams still played some Class B schools — not successfully, I might add.

We didn't play Plattsmouth in football my senior year, but we opened the basketball season against the Blue Devils. I do remember two years earlier, when my older brother started on the football team, we played at Plattsmouth. Since moving to Buccaneer Bay in 2017, I

occasionally find myself driving by the "old field," which causes flashbacks to that game.

The coach was honest at the outset when he said my playing time would be limited. I appreciated that but still agreed to be on the team knowing that it likely would have put me in better shape for baseball — the lone sport at which I excelled. I'm glad I did, because I had a great final season.

Speaking of high school baseball, I kept tabs on the Plattsmouth spring and summer teams — mostly because one of the standouts, Gabe Villamonte, lives just across the Boulevard from us. (You might recall he was featured in the newsletter after his team fell just short of the Class C spring title.)

As you'll note elsewhere in this issue, Gabe and his Legion teammates got sweet revenge at the Class B state tournament held in Pierce. Representing Plattsmouth Legion Post 56, the boys beat Wahoo 4-2 in the championship game. To get there, Plattsmouth blanked Wayne 4-0 to avenge the loss the Blue Devils suffered against Wayne in the spring tournament.

Gabe was one of three stars on the mound this summer. Wichita Statebound Drew Iverson was 9-0 and led the state with 125 strikeouts in 55 innings (wow!). His ERA was 0.38.

Gabe went 6-1 with 64 strikeouts and a 0.51 ERA. Sam Campin chipped in with a 7-2 record.

Gabe, Plattsmouth's starting quarter-back, then engineered the football team to a season-opening 20-17 overtime win over then-No. 5 Blair. How cool would it be to see him close his high school career with state titles in his two favorite sports — football and baseball?

State Legion champs honored

Revenge was sweet for the Plattsmouth Legion baseball team and, especially, for pitcher Gabe Villamonte last month at the Class B state tournament held in Pierce in northeast Nebraska. Representing Post 56, the Haswell Construction Blue Devils beat Wahoo State Bank 4-2 in the championship game.

It was the first state Legion title for Plattsmouth in 39 years, and Gabe was still all smiles when the team was honored Aug. 19 at the Plattsmouth VFW Club's pancake feed fundraiser.

"It was crazy," Gabe said about the tournament. "It felt like the job was finally finished."

Most of his teammates were members of the high school team that finished second in the spring state tournament. And the summer title made up for a Legion runner-up finish a year ago.

Most memorable for the Buc Bay resident, who pitches with both arms, was his effort in Plattsmouth's 4-0 win over Wayne on July 31. Gabe faced just 21 batters on 75 pitches, erasing the pain of losing to Wayne in the spring state tournament.

"I was full of energy for that," Gabe said. "I thought I could run a couple miles after the game."

He couldn't believe how quickly the summer went.

"I thought it was going to last a little longer," he said. "It was like snapping my fingers and it was over."

"Ten of our 11 players on offense are coming back," he said. "Our first three games are going to be tough."





SID#5 Covenants - Architectural Control

The Buccaneer Bay Architectural Control process of reviewing requests for changes on your property is now being managed by Teresa Dilts and Kayla Graff. They will be working with Mike Jensen, Cass County Zoning Administrator.

There are 8 sets of Covenants for Buccaneer Bay. It seems like every time a new section of Buccaneer Bay opened up another set of covenants was made. I try to make sure that every resident in Buccaneer Bay gets a copy of the covenants that is for their section of the neighborhood. Some realtors will provide a copy of the covenants to the buyer, but I don't think all of them do. Most of the covenants have some sort of termination clause.

All sets of covenants are filed at the Register of Deeds office at the Court House. Not all of the covenants have the same number of years that the covenants are in force.

HILLS COVENANTS in the second section titled: "AMENDED DECLARATION OF COVENANTS, CONDITIONS AND RESTRICTIONS", which covers the following: These covenants shall run with the land and be binding upon the current and future Owners of all Lots in Blocks One (1) through Six (6), inclusive; all Lots in Blocks Fifteen (15) through Twenty (20), inclusive; Lots one (1) through Five (5) in Block Seven (7), and; Lot Ten (10) in Block Fourteen (14), all in Buccaneer Bay, a subdivision as surveyed, platted and recorded in Cass County, Nebraska, until the year 2029, together with any Lots created by a replat of these Lots, and shall be continued for successive periods of twenty-five (25) years unless sooner modified or terminated in writing by seventy-five percent (75%) or more of the then record owners of the Properties, with one vote per Lot.

BAY LAKE COVENANTS in the second section titled: "AMENDED DECLARATION OF COVENANTS, CONDITIONS AND RESTRICTIONS", which covers the following Blocks: Block 21, 22, 23, 24, and 26 until the year 2000, at which time the covenants shall be extended for *successive terms* of 25 years, which should make them good until 2025.

Block 31 in Buccaneer Bay incudes Windward Dr. and all side streets in this section, approved in September 2008 for term of 25 years, which would then expire in 2033.

Blk 28 Lots 8A/B, Lots 9A/B, and Lot 10 on Lakeside Dr. These first 2 townhomes and one house are under the original covenants for Lakeside Dr. approved May 18, 2005 for a term of 25 years, which should terminate in 2030.

Blk 28, Lots 1A – 24B, minus Lots 8A/B, 9A/B and Lot 10 on Lakeside Dr. as described in the Covenants from Lone Tree Holdings. Approved May 18, 2017 for a term of 30 years, which would terminate in 2047.

Bucc Bay 1st Edition – Lots 1R – 39R – Davy Jones Dr. and Davy Jones Cir. Filed February 14, 1996 for a term of 25 years. These Covenants have expired.

Blk 29 Lots 1-26 Fairway Cir., Blk 30 Lots 1-6 – Fairway Dr. – Covenants and restrictions shall run with and bind the land and for a term of twenty-five years. Filed May 18th, 2005, which would expire in 2030.

Blk 27 Lots 1A – 20B, and Lots 21 – 62 – Sailboat Lake – The Covenants and restrictions shall run with and bind the land for a term of 25 years. Filed December 23, 1996, the Covenants have been renewed.

Residents under the covenants that will be expiring can be renewed by having residents who want to have the covenants continue review and update them. Each set of covenants has a specification of how many signatures are required to approve the revised covenants. It has been done, but it takes a lot of work. Once the covenants are out of date, that section of residents will no longer have to follow any restrictions for their section.

Note: The process below may be modified as the Newsletter and Welcome Packages are being updated.

Each time a new resident moves in they receive a Welcome Package that has a copy of the covenants for their location. The information on new residents come in an email from Peoples Service. Jill Bobenhouse-Teaser will take on putting the Welcome Packages together and provide the packages to the appropriate Block Captain so the new resident can fill out a Data Sheet to be sent to one of the members taking over for Janet. The changes will require the new information to be added to the Buccaneer Bay Phone Directory, if the new resident approves, and update the Block Captains list as residents move in and out.
