



Uniform trash collection eyed

Editor's Note: The normal monthly feature on a Buc Bay resident is suspended as we yield to the important news regarding a possible switch to the same trashcollection company for all residents. While most of our neighbors have seen the information on Facebook and Nextdoor, there are those who aren't getting those updates. So for those who haven't received the information, here it is as supplied by SID Board member **Dave Martin:**

SID 5 solicited proposals for a single trash hauler for the District. The SID reached out to several different vendors; however, Gretna Sanitation was the only provider that submitted a proposal.

The SID 5 Board has voted to enter into contract negotiations with Gretna Sanitation for them to be the sole provider of trash service in the District for 5 years with the 3 bin option listed below.

The Board solicited residence feedback and only a small number of residents responded, 22 residents for and 6 against entering into a contract with Gretna Sanitation.

The Board received a proposal for a 5 year contract with the options outlined below. All prices are plus any sales tax (if any).

1 Recycle Bin



The SID Board has entered into negotiations with Gretna Sanitation for trash removal for all Buc Bay residents.

Note: The Board would select one of the options below (bottom of this page) and all residents would be billed the same amount regardless of how many bins they choose.

FAQ

How will I be billed for the trash service?

The monthly fee would be added to water bill as a separate line item. Residents would not pay Gretna Sanitation, they would

pay SID 5 and SID 5 would pay Gretna Sanitation.

Is the proposed fee subject to a fuel surcharge?

Possibly, this needs to be negotiated with Gretna Sanitation. Gretna Sanitation uses compressed natural gas (CNG) trucks and CNG prices do not usually fluctuate like diesel. However at times Gretna has seen significant fluctuations in CNG prices.

How often will the recycle bin be picked up?

Recycling will be picked up every other week.

How often will the yard waste bin be picked up?

Yard waste will be picked up weekly April 1 through November 30.

What happens to the yard waste?

If there is enough participation in the yard waste program the yard waste will be composted at Gretna Sanitation's Cass County composting facility. If there is not enough participation the yard waste will go to landfill.

If the 3 cart option is selected by the Board do I have to have all 3 carts? I may not need or have enough room for all of the carts.

No, prior to the start of Gretna Sanitation commencing pickup; residents will be given an opportunity to identify which services they would like.

Can yard waste bins be used for trash during the winter months?

Yes, the yard waste bin may be used for regular trash December through March.

Will I be able to opt out of using Gretna Sanitation and keep using my current provider?

You can elect to not use Gretna Sanitation for your trash service but *you will still be billed for the service*. The proposed contract is based on 12 months of billing for all residents in the SID.

It is not unusual for me to spend several months of the year in another state or

residence and will not need trash service at my Buccaneer Bay residence for those months; can I temporarily pause service and not be billed?

No, you will still have to pay the monthly trash fee. The proposed contract is based on 12 months of billing for all residents in the SID.

If the SID enters into the contract with Gretna Sanitation when will it go into effect and how will this impact residents that have to make quarterly payments to their current provider?

If the SID enters into the contract with Gretna Sanitation the start date will have to be negotiated. We would work with Gretna Sanitation to make the transition as smooth as possible for our residents. Gretna Sanitation has significant experience in transitioning SIDs in Douglas County and Sarpy County to a single trash provider.

Does Gretna Sanitation have the experience and capacity to service Buccaneer Bay?

Gretna Sanitation has been providing trash service to SIDs in Sarpy County and Douglas County for several years. Our interactions with Gretna Sanitation indicate they are more than ca-

pable of providing quality service to the residents of Buccaneer Bay.

How big will the trash, yard waste and recycle bins be?

The bins will be 96 gallons.

Will the Hefty Energy Bag, aka Orange Bag recycle program still be available?

Yes. The Hefty Energy Bag aka Orange Bag recycle program will still be available. All soft flexible plastics, juice pouches, snack bags, chip bags, straws, plastic stirrers, plastic cutlery, candy wrappers, cake mix box liners, cereal box liners and foam "to go" containers can be placed in the Hefty Energy Bag and placed in your recycle bin. Standard plastics, paper, cardboard and aluminum will be placed directly in the bin.

Do the contents of the recycle bin ever get dumped in the landfill vs. actually being recycled?

No, the contents of the recycle bin will always be transported to the First Star recycling center.

Will paper leaf bags be picked up?

Yes, **IF** you have a yard waste bin. Up to 5 paper leaf bags can be placed next to your yard waste bin and they will be picked up. If you do not have a yard waste bin the paper leaf bags will NOT be picked up.

The 3 bin option says you can have 1 trash, 1 trash or 1 yard waste and 1 recycle bin; can you have 1 trash and 2 recycle bins?

Unknown at this time, we will ask Gretna Sanitation during contract negotiations.

Packers coach played in Omaha

Here we are starting another year, and my question remains: Where has the time gone? The combination of being retired and aging way too fast must have something to do with it as we approach (in six months) the end of seven years of Buc Bay life.

First off, here's hoping that everyone had a festive Christmas and New Year's Eve with friends and family. That's one of the many benefits of living in our little village — making new friends and growing those relationships.

Packers game, and when the camera was focused on their coach, Matt LaFleur, a (very small) lightbulb went off inside my head. For some reason, I thought, that name should

ring a bell.

A quick Google search of his name solved the mystery. LaFleur once was a quarterback for the Omaha Beef during my time covering the indoor football team for the World-Herald. The reason he was easily forgotten: He started just one game for the Beef in 2003.

I'm not sure he'll remember it, but LaFleur engineered Omaha to a 63-39 road win over Wyoming on June 20. He also appeared in three other games. LaFleur intended to take up coaching at his alma mater, Saginaw (Mich.) Valley State, where he accumulated 6,791 career passing yards and 7,682 total yards — both school records.

Post-Beef, LaFleur turned to coaching in 2004, first at Central Michigan as a grad assistant. After two more college assistant gigs, he got his first NFL assistant job with the Houston Texans in 2008. After four seasons with Washington, he moved back to the college ranks as quarterbacks coach at Notre

Dame for one season (2014). From there he spent time back in the NFL with Atlanta, the L.A. Rams and Tennessee Titans before being named head coach of the Packers, starting with the 2019 season.

Buc Bay residents witness Huskers' bid for title





SID#5 Covenants - Architectural Control

The Buccaneer Bay Architectural Control process of reviewing requests for changes on your property is now being managed by Teresa Dilts and Kayla Graff. They will be working with Mike Jensen, Cass County Zoning Administrator.

There are 8 sets of Covenants for Buccaneer Bay. It seems like every time a new section of Buccaneer Bay opened up another set of covenants was made. I try to make sure that every resident in Buccaneer Bay gets a copy of the covenants that is for their section of the neighborhood. Some realtors will provide a copy of the covenants to the buyer, but I don't think all of them do. Most of the covenants have some sort of termination clause.

All sets of covenants are filed at the Register of Deeds office at the Court House. Not all of the covenants have the same number of years that the covenants are in force.

HILLS COVENANTS in the second section titled: "AMENDED DECLARATION OF COVENANTS, CONDITIONS AND RESTRICTIONS", which covers the following: These covenants shall run with the land and be binding upon the current and future Owners of all Lots in Blocks One (1) through Six (6), inclusive; all Lots in Blocks Fifteen (15) through Twenty (20), inclusive; Lots one (1) through Five (5) in Block Seven (7), and; Lot Ten (10) in Block Fourteen (14), all in Buccaneer Bay, a subdivision as surveyed, platted and recorded in Cass County, Nebraska, until the year 2029, together with any Lots created by a replat of these Lots, and shall be continued for successive periods of twenty-five (25) years unless sooner modified or terminated in writing by seventy-five percent (75%) or more of the then record owners of the Properties, with one vote per Lot.

BAY LAKE COVENANTS in the second section titled: "AMENDED DECLARATION OF COVENANTS, CONDITIONS AND RESTRICTIONS", which covers the following Blocks: Block 21, 22, 23, 24, and 26 until the year 2000, at which time the covenants shall be extended for *successive terms* of 25 years, which should make them good until 2025.

Block 31 in Buccaneer Bay incudes Windward Dr. and all side streets in this section, approved in September 2008 for term of 25 years, which would then expire in 2033.

Blk 28 Lots 8A/B, Lots 9A/B, and Lot 10 on Lakeside Dr. These first 2 townhomes and one house are under the original covenants for Lakeside Dr. approved May 18, 2005 for a term of 25 years, which should terminate in 2030.

Blk 28, Lots 1A – 24B, minus Lots 8A/B, 9A/B and Lot 10 on Lakeside Dr. as described in the Covenants from Lone Tree Holdings. Approved May 18, 2017 for a term of 30 years, which would terminate in 2047.

Bucc Bay 1st Edition – Lots 1R – 39R – Davy Jones Dr. and Davy Jones Cir. Filed February 14, 1996 for a term of 25 years. These Covenants have expired.

Blk 29 Lots 1-26 Fairway Cir., Blk 30 Lots 1-6 – Fairway Dr. – Covenants and restrictions shall run with and bind the land and for a term of twenty-five years. Filed May 18th, 2005, which would expire in 2030.

Blk 27 Lots 1A – 20B, and Lots 21 – 62 – Sailboat Lake – The Covenants and restrictions shall run with and bind the land for a term of 25 years. Filed December 23, 1996, the Covenants have been renewed.

Residents under the covenants that will be expiring can be renewed by having residents who want to have the covenants continue review and update them. Each set of covenants has a specification of how many signatures are required to approve the revised covenants. It has been done, but it takes a lot of work. Once the covenants are out of date, that section of residents will no longer have to follow any restrictions for their section.

Note: The process below may be modified as the Newsletter and Welcome Packages are being updated.

Each time a new resident moves in they receive a Welcome Package that has a copy of the covenants for their location. The information on new residents come in an email from Peoples Service. Jill Bobenhouse-Teaser will take on putting the Welcome Packages together and provide the packages to the appropriate Block Captain so the new resident can fill out a Data Sheet to be sent to one of the members taking over for Janet. The changes will require the new information to be added to the Buccaneer Bay Phone Directory, if the new resident approves, and update the Block Captains list as residents move in and out.
